The State of Maine, and New England as a larger entity, seemed to have that figurative "ace in the hole" as they reached for aviation influence in the 1940s, but that apparent advantage didn't do what it might have done. Maine's Senator Ralph Owen Brewster who exercised considerable authority up until, and through, World War II had the support and trust of the political leaders necessary to achieve that end. As Chairman of the Senate Aviation Sub-committee, he was in a position to have substantial influence in the award of international routes to US airlines.

Contrary to New England's interest, his active support for a single "flag

carrier" did not help Northeast Airlines in its quest for approval of North Atlantic routes, some of which it had pioneered. Conversely, his support for Pan American as the US "flag" airline, perhaps somewhat in reaction to that aggressive support, did not result in the domestic routes that company had long pursued. Instead, the CAB, the Civil Aeronautics Board, in its economic jurisdiction awarded extensive North Atlantic routes, through southern Europe and the Middle East, and beyond, to TWA, and extended the authority for northern Europe, previously granted to American Export Airlines, to AOA, American Overseas Airlines.

That left Northeast as the local service it had long been, and Pan American without the "fifth freedom" cross country connections for its Atlantic, Pacific Alaska, and Latin American Divisions.

Although there were later changes in their corporate existences, those decisions. no doubt affected Northeast and Pan American throughout their remaining business lives.

Senator Brewster was not left unscathed. Events following those actions, as touched upon in Martin Scorsese's new movie, The Aviator, had a disastrous, if not immediate, effect on his government career.

Jim Brunelle, quoted in the December 24, 2004, Portland Press Herald, in regard to the 43rd anniversary of Brewster's death, on December 25th, 1961, and the movie The Aviator, said that Brewster ... is about to enjoy a resurrection of sorts.

Brunelle goes on ... Brewster, played by Alan Alda, comes into the movie as head of a special senate committee looking into military contracts in the mid-1940s. The Maine Republican targeted Hughes' plane manufacturing company for collecting \$40 million from the government in developing two aircraft that had never been delivered.

Brunelle now paraphrases Hughes' claims about Brewster ... he began by raising questions about Brewster's motives. Two years earlier, after

Hughes' Trans World Airlines was awarded overseas flying rights in competition with Pan American Airways, the Maine senator sponsored a bill to take back TWA's government approved transatlantic routes... Hughes spread rumors about Brewster's being in Pan Am's pocket, having accepted free flights and accommodations for several Florida vacation trips and overseas junkets paid for by the airline. Furthermore, Hughes charged, Brewster had approached him secretly and offered to drop the congressional investigation if TWA would agree to a takeover by Pan Am.

Such claims and counterclaims left the Senate hearing in a shambles. It was concluded without decision. This, and other things, unrelated to aviation, one of which was support for Senator Joe McCarthy, seriously eroded Brewster's popularity at home, even in his own party. He was replaced in the Republican Primary in 1952 by retiring Governor Frederick Payne, whose biggest financial supporter was reported to be ... Howard Hughes.

The movie, The Aviator, is only a movie, replete with hyperbole, but for those of us connected with the aviation world it's probably worth three hours in the dark in a theatre seat.



Minutes of Directors Meeting September 30, 2005

Jim Nelligan reported on gift shop sales of \$139.00 and last years cost of fuel. Art Johnson reported sales of \$44.00 at Greenville.

Elections are due and a committee needs to be formed. 6 new board members are needed. Three for two years and three for one year. Nominating committee to consist of Mike, Dan, Joel, Al, Scott and Hank. There was a discussion to nominate Honorary directors and several prominent people were mentioned to be approached.

Norm talked about the New Hampshire Museum and the success they have had.

Nominated were: President: Les Shaw, V. Pres: Leo or Norm, Treasurer: Quinn, Sec: W Townsend It was suggested that the offices of President and Vice President be staggered. President for two years and Vice President for one year. Hank suggested we form a committee of accountant's for a fund raising committee. We also need an inventory committee to look after our exhibits. Hank closed nominations and it was seconded and voted.

Mike brought up the sign permits and found we were in violation but he would take care of it. Only two signs are allowed but temporary signs are ok.

Scott suggested that we dedicate the library to Leo Boyle as an archive. Leo Boyle Archives. A motion was made, seconded and approved.

Norm suggested that we get rid of the paperbacks in the library and pass them out to the returning troops by the greeters. New Business

Dan read a letter from Leo Boyle regarding his archives. Scott advised that Leo wanted all his archives to go to the museum. Norm asked about the skeleton of the plane on display and what it's relation to Maine aviation was. It supposedly was representative of early CAP planes used during the war.

Other Business

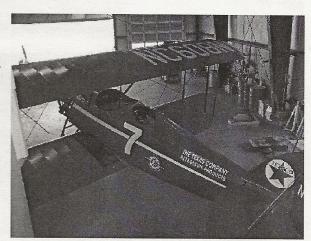

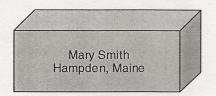


Buy a Brick and Support the Maine Air Museum

→ Stratocumulus Member (SC) — \$100 Donation

Entitles the gift giver to a one year membership and two-year museum pass and a benefactor's engraved 4"x8"x2.5" red clay brick with up to two lines (14 characters/line, .65" high) of commemorative test in the name of the gift giver and his/her memorial to others. Brick to be installed on the museum grounds, walkway or building façade.

→ Altostratus Member (AS) — \$150 Donation

Entitles the gift giver to a two year membership and three-year museum pass, copy of The United States Air Force in Maine, and a benefactor's engraved 4"x8"x2.5" red clay brick with up to two lines (14 characters/line, .65" high) of commemorative test in the name of the gift giver and his/her memorial to others. Brick to be installed on the museum grounds, walkway or building façade.

Altocumulus Member (AC) — \$250 donation

Entitles the gift giver to a five year membership and five-year museum pass and a benefactor's engraved 4"x8"x2.5" pearl gray marble brick with up to two lines (14 characters/line, .65" high) of commemorative test in the name of the gift giver and his/her memorial to others. Brick to be installed on the museum grounds, walkway or building façade.

→ Cirrus Member (CJ) — \$2500 Donation

Entitles the gift giver to a life membership status and a benefactor's engraved three foot white marble setting bench with one line (27 characters/line, 2" high) of commemorative test in the name of the gift giver and his/her memorial to others. Bench to be installed in the museum building or on the museum grounds.

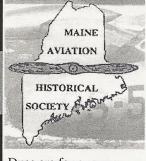
