Research . . . and Interesting Developments

The following article was written by David Grima and appeared in the *Rockland Courier Gazette* on April 10, 1993. Many thanks to them for allowing us to reprint this interesting piece. It's little things like this that add to our aviation history and make sure we don't forget the local people who did so much for aviation.

Memories of Fisette's Flying Machines

ROCKLAND — Ralph Stone has some clear memories of Chester Fisette and his airplanes on New County Road, back in the 1930s. His memories were raked up by the March 25 'Now & Then' feature about George Hall's place on that street.

According to Stone, the place that Hall now uses as a base for his general contracting work was built by Chester Fisette, and run as an auto showroom and body shop. Fisette also worked on airplanes, especially recovering their flimsy hides with fabric. Fisette had the place built with an apartment above, where he lived with his wife, Hazel, and son, Tim.

Stone remembers playing with Tim after moving to the neighborhood in 1934. He recalls watching the whole process


of covering airplane wings and fuselages with linen, which was then painted with dope to make it taut as a drum.

Fisette had a grass airstrip on Pleasant Street, mowed to just about where the city highway garage is today. He used to taxi his airplanes from the New County Road building along Belvidere to fly from the strip.

One day, Stone says, Fisette had neglected to mow the strip properly. Taking off was no problem. Landing was another thing. Down came the machine, tangling its undercarriage in the long grass, and over went the tail, flipping the whole thing upside down.

Fearing the worst, Stone and his father, Ralph Sr., went over with fire extinguishers. But all was well. Stone is not sure what kind of machine Fisette used to hop around in. He remembers a beige monoplane, with a low wing and two open cockpits. Aviation arrived in Rockland in the late 1920s, and there were several airstrips and a seaplane base here by the time things got going. South School on Holmes Street was the site of an airstrip associated with Capt. Wincapaw. Dave's Restaurant in Thomaston is adjacent to the site of another airstrip. Rockland Public Landing once had a seaplane base. Stone's valuable memories are another piece of the picture.

There is a postscript to this story. Gladys Horton of Warren is Fisette's daughter, although she only knew her dad shortly before he died. Horton says that her father used to build his own airplanes. This may explain why Stone could not place the model he remembers.
