Spring Expeditions Planned

Great Photos, Got Any More?





This picture was taken at Godfrey Field, Bangor on Memorial Day 1938 prior to take-off for a fly-by in memory of Merle Fogg. Merle was from Enfield. He did quite a bit of barnstorming in Maine in the '20s and started a flying service in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. He was killed in a crash on May 1, 1928.

There is a memorial plaque to him naming the airport "Merle Fogg Airport."

Enola Gay, Hiroshima and the Smithsonian: History Out of Context

Just look at the controversy the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum has stirred up over their proposed Enola Gay-Hiroshima exhibit. Let's remember one thing: history was made in a different time than the one we're living in today, and values may have been very different then than now.

Our job is to preserve history, not to change it. I would like to quote Henry Cord Meyer from the book Airshipmen, Businessmen and Politics, 1890-1940 (published by the Smithsonian).

In reference to Count von Zepplin, Meyer states, "It does him no dishonor to see him clearly as a child of his times . . ."


Dues News


