Notes from a Productive February Meeting

The February meeting of the MAHS was held February 14, 1998 at the American Legion Hall in Bangor. About twenty-five members attended and a spirited and open meeting resulted. After being snowed out twice in January, it was great to see such great interest. The results were all positive and we are once again proceeding full steam ahead. With most of the money raised internally for the fundraising feasibility study, we are proceeding ahead with this phase. Ed Armstrong was appraising the three fundraisers we interviewed of our choice and our decision. We hope to have more to report on this decision at the March meeting and a better idea of what we have to do to aid in this project.

A meeting was arranged of the Museum Committee. At that meeting, we drew up our counter proposal for the lease with the City of Bangor. This has been presented to them and they will get back to us. We do not anticipate any major problems in bringing this matter to a successful conclusion.


The treasurer reported a balance of \$2,421.00 in the checking account with one outstanding bill of \$280 for legal services related to the lease and revision of the size of the Board of Directors. Over \$9,000.00 had been raised for the feasibility study and was invested in a money market fund.

After some discussion regarding the duties of the various officers, Scott Grant was nominated as Vice President and George Tinker was nominated as Treasurer, with Leo Boyle continuing as Secretary. The members and the chairmen of the committees were reviewed and the nominees and the chairmen agreed upon their increased responsibilities. With this additional help, Jim Chichetto, who wished to be relieved of his duties, agreed to serve as President for another year, and was so nominated. Candidates for our enlarged Board of Directors were reviewed. Do not forget to vote as soon as possible for your new officers and Board of Directors members. The long discussion of the above matters ran until noon and the meeting was adjourned. We regret that we did not have time for Rick Alexander's slide show.

Bill Townsend is working on a web page and we hope to be on the Internet later this month. Ed Armstrong has procured a post office box in Bangor and this will be the official MAHS address. 

John Edward Van Horn Federal Aviation Agency Official

We are saddened to report the recent loss of John Van Horn, FAA official who was well-known in Maine aviation circles.

John Edward Van Horn, 78, of Running Springs Road died Tuesday at a Portland nursing home after a short battle with cancer.

He was born at Bowdoin, son of James and Helen Kelly Van Horn, and attended Charleston schools.

Mr. Van Horn went on to study aviation in the Navy while serving during World War II. He worked for the federal government for many years and eventually became chief of the Federal Aviation Agency, until he retired in 1978 and moved to Gorham.

The April meeting probably will be held at the Portland Jetport Conference Room. We also plan to hold one or two meetings in Houlton with exciting programs.



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
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Notes from the Past

Portland Evening Express, January 27, 1944, page 12 British Pilot Dies in Flames as Training Place Crashes

North Windham (Special) — A British pilot trapped in the cockpit of his flaming Grumman Wildcat IV (FN110) after it crashed in the woods here late Wednesday afternoon was burned to death.

The single-motored ship from 738 Squadron reported by the Navy officials at the Brunswick Naval Air Station as on a routine training flight from the Naval Air Station at Lewiston-Auburn, crashed near Sebago Lake Outlet, two miles in from the Outlet Road, North Windham. Officials said name of the pilot was being withheld pending notification of next of kin. North Windham firemen, wading through knee-deep snow from Outlet Bridge across the head gates of the S.D. Warren Paper Company dam and through the woods on the east shore of the Outlet, fround the pilot dead and the plane still blazing.

Town residents reported the plane, trailing smoke, circled the vicinity several times as the pilot apparently sought an emergency landing field. The plane apparently hurtled down between the trees, one wing plowing a long furrow in the snow before it upended and crashed back into the snow. It came to rest right side up with its fuselage nearly broken in two, the tail wedged into a tree and the wings badly crushed.

Bertrand Morrill of Outlet Road notified firemen of the crash and fire. A salvage crew from the air base at Brunswick was sent to the crash immediately.

Portland Evening Express, February 1, 1944, page 7 Military Honors for Plane Victim

Kittery (Special) — Full military honors were accorded Sylvester K. Robey, Sub-Lieutenant, RAF, who was burned to death in a plane crash at North Windham last Wednesday, at funeral services at the Navy yard here Monday afternoon.

Lt. Lloyd F. Shepard, USNR, Chaplain Corps, conducted the services and Rear Admiral Thomas Withers, USN, Yard Commandant, headed the office group in attendance. There was a Marine guard of honor and volley by a Marine detachment followed by Taps.

Earl Stimpert, William Cobb, Albert Ethols, Rex Pettigrow, Joseph Parks, Elmer Feitter, British sailors stationed at the Brunswick Naval Air Station from which Lt. Robey was flying, were bearers. Burial was in the Navy Yard cemetery.







