Owls Head Transportation Museum

On Saturday, June 26, and Sunday, June 27, 1999, the MAHS constructed and manned a display at the Owls Head "Sentimental Journey" WWII aircraft and auto show.

Scott Grant brought up a table and Owls Head provided two more. Scott also brought up the Elephant Mountain B-52 ejection seat and his Richmond F-84 board. Leo Boyle brought up his many display photos and the new MAHS Roland Maheu shirts. Carl Sederquist brought his TV/video computer museum display and Jim Chichetto brought up his boards, artifacts and photo albums.

Once set up it was a large display and we had a good group of visitors. The crowds were down this year, maybe the lack of fighters was to blame. The weather was great and skies were excellent for flying acts and photo flights. On Sunday, the crowds were about the same, but they were not as overwhelming as in the past. MAHS gained a few new members and our thanks to the above mentioned for their work on our behalf.

Great Lewiston-Auburn Air Show

July 3, 1999 dawned bright, warm and clear. Scott Grant brought most of the MAHS display from the Owls Head show the week before and set up the tables and boards. Leo Boyle arrived from the south and Jim Chichetto from the north shortly after 9:00 a.m. to help. The many assembled civilian aircraft which use the L-A Airport became part of the display as well as a number of interesting aircraft which flew in for the event.

Dan Bilodeau flew his natural finished Luscombe in for the show and sold Pepsi donated by Seltzer & Rydholm to raise funds for the Maine Air Museum. MAHS member Alan Fernald bought the first bottle and won a ride. Alan, who has a single and multi-engine ticket, was happy with his luck. Members John Miller and Larry Nickerson each had their sales displays up. The walking crowd was good for the first few hours, but most of them walked to the warbird area and most vendors and display people hope to be set up in that area next year.

The good-sized crowd was treated to stunt planes doing loops and rolls and head-to-head smoking passes; then the skydivers jumped out, one single and three hooked together carrying the American flag. As they slowly drifted down, the bi-planes flew smoking rings around the jumpers. After the first two acts, a Stearman flew a stunt routine and a T-6 followed up with a nice display of flying. The static displays included an Avenger, a Chipmunk, a Beech twin painted up as a U.S. Army Missile Command aircraft, various military trainers and civilian aircraft. It was a good show, but once again, Scott, Leo and Jim did all the display. We need more help from all our members!

Board of Directors Meeting + July 10, 1999


- 1.0 The MAHS Board was convened by the MAHS vice president with a quorum present at 0910. Charles Brantner (MAHS accountant) was present, along with other MAHS members.
- 2.0 MAHS secretary Leo Boyle reported that \$5,000 had been withdrawn from the MAHS money market account and transferred into the general funds account. As of June 30, 1999 the money market account balance was \$7,069.41. The general fund balance is \$5,755.54 as of July 9.
- 3.0 The MAHS treasurer, George Tinker, expressed his regrets that he would no longer be able to serve in this capacity and stated that he would serve until a replacement was found. He also discussed some recommended changes in financial procedures for operating expenses and payments. Both the MAHS treasurer and secretary currently have operating fund checkbooks. Charles Brantner recommended that only one checkbook be maintained to conform to accepted accounting principles for MAHS receipts and disbursements of operating expenses.
 - 3.1 The Board accepted Mr. Tinker's resignation with regret and sincere appreciation for his service as treasurer to date. A motion was made by Mr. Hurd; seconded and unanimously approved by the Board to have secretary Boyle prepare a suitable MAHS certificate of appreciation for George Tinker to be awarded to him at a later MAHS membership meeting.
 - 3.2 The Board was surveyed as to volunteers or nominations to fill the MAHS treasurer's vacancy. Mr. Brantner volunteered to fill this position. Secretary Boyle recommended that Mr. Brantner be elected as the interim treasurer until the annual elections. Vice president Peter Hurd then made a motion that Charles B. Brantner be elected as the MAHS treasurer effective this date, and that an orderly transition between Mr. Tinker and he be accomplished as soon as possible. After discussions of who can incur MAHS financial obligations and not-too-exceed limits of such obligations, a vote (8-0) was taken by the Board to appoint Mr. Brantner as MAHS treasurer.
- 4.0 The Board recognized with sincere appreciation the work of Carl Sederquist in locating an anonymous donor who pledged \$10,000 for the Society's Maine Air Museum (MAM) fund if the MAHS could match it. The Board asked Mr. Sederquist to determine if there was a time limit, and if so, what it was. He will confirm that time frame at our next meeting., In response to this initiative, the Board discussed a future formal MAHS MAM advisory status for major financial contributors. Further policy discussion to be conducted by the Board at the next meeting.
- 5.0 The pending MAM Building 98 lease by the city of Bangor was discussed by secretary Boyle. Some issues remain for resolution. The city is expected to present a revised lease to the MAHS within the next 10 days. Secretary Boyle to mail each Board member a copy of the revised lease when available with a telephone vote to follow for acceptance.
- 6.0 The Board received a report from Al Cormier who has been spearheading the utilities checkout and functions for Bangor International Airport (BIA) Building 98. Mr. Cormier's frequent e-mail updates were especially noted as being highly appreciated.
- 7.0 Vice president Hurd reported on his telephone discussions with Gary Boon, one of eight members of the Presque Isle (PQI) Air Museum committee. Mr. Boon had contacted Al Cormier to set up a meeting on September 8 in Bangor at the Cole Museum of Transportation. Mr. Hurd stated that he requested that the requested meeting coincide with one of the MAHS

68 Years Ago This Month — August 1931 Airline Service Comes to Maine

In 1931, the Boston & Maine and Maine Central Railroads contracted with Pan American Airways to fly airline service from Boston to Portland and Bangor for them. In addition, Pan American started flying boat service over the same routes and beyond to Calais and Halifax, Nova Scotia as a possible prelude to trans-Atlantic service. These services began on August 3, 1931 and continued through September 1931. In 1932, Pan American declined to continue this service, and in 1933 the railroads contracted with National Airways to fly the Boston to Bangor service as Boston & Maine Airways. This service was flown with Stinson SM-6000A tri-motors starting August 11, 1933. Boston & Maine Airways became Northeast Airlines in 1940 and was absorbed by Delta Airlines in 1972.





Treasurer George Tinker has tendered his resignation and the Board regretfully accepted it. Charles Brantner volunteered to fill out George's term. He was unanimously approved by the Board.

The Board meeting ran long, but the rain slowed up the arrival of our guest speaker, Tom Casagrande of Portland. Tom gave a great slide show starting with his first Cub flight and then on into the U.S. Army where he flew Hueys in Vietnam and various fixed wing aircraft during a second tour. His combat stories and slides brought home to many the world of difference between WWII and the fighting in Southeast Asia.

Tom came home to fly experimental aircraft out of Lakehurst, New Jersey. Doing projects for most of the three letter government groups, he's managed to fly over 115 different types of aircraft in his work and private life so far.



scheduled meetings, but Mr. Boon indicated that his committee would not be available until September 8. MAHS members then discussed providing the PQI committee with an honorary membership in the MAHS and sending their committee a copy of the MAHS Dirigo Flyer (D/F). Secretary Boyle stated that the MAHS bylaws provide only for a paid membership. The PQI committee will receive a complimentary copy of the D/F.

- 8.0 The secretary was requested to ensure that the BIA airport manager receives a personal copy of the D/F.
- 9.0 MAM committee chairman Chichetto gave a brief report of the MAM development plan status. Vice president Hurd requested that the Board receive a copy of the updated plan ASAP, stating that it was essential to have it as part of the fundraising initiative and for current budgetary considerations.
- 10. Vice president Hurd stated that a copy of the current MAHS bylaws would be sent to all members with know e-mail capability within the next five days. He requested that secretary Boyle include a copy of the current bylaws in the next D/F issue and provided Mr. Boyle with a camera-ready copy of same. All MAHS members were requested to review the current bylaws in view of the MAHS expanded role with the MAM and other functional committees.
- 11. The MAHS Board meeting was concluded at 1007, so that the regular MAHS membership meeting could proceed with guest speaker Mr. Tom Casagrande, noted aviator.

"Bill gave me my first aircraft ride in the State's Wtinson Gull Wing Reliant (300hp radial). It was silver and on floats.

"While refueling at the old hatchery at Cold Stream Pond in Enfield, I stepped on Bill's Raybans and broke them. He hollered, I cried (I was 11 years old), so he took me for a flight to soothe my feelings.

"It was my first flight and the start of my flying adventures, summer 1946."

Directions from Bucksport: Stay on Route 1 and 3 and 15 (lots of roads coming together here). From the light at the Irving gas station, go just over 4 miles east/north and veer right onto Maine 15 to Blue Hill. (There's a Big Apple/Texaco at the corner.)

After approximately 15 miles you will come to "downtown" Blue Hill. Take a right at the Exxon station. Go up the hill, past the Congregational Church. Turn left onto 172/175.

When you come to where 175 turns left (about 3 miles), stay on 172 for 1.1 miles. Veer right at driveway with sign that says "Jessup." (There are two driveways close together, ours is the second one.) About 100 feet up, turn right and there's our house. Logs with red doors.

Directions from Ellsworth: From Route 1A south (Bangor), turn right (south) onto Route 1 (Dunkin' Donuts at corner) and go through downtown Ellsworth, across the bridge and up the hill. Veer left at blinking yellow light (may not be blinking, just hanging there) onto 172.

Stay on 172 through "downtown" Blue Hill, then up the hill. Turn left onto 172/175. Got about 3 miles. 175 will go left to Blue Hill Falls. DON'T TURN! Go another 1.1 miles on 172. There's be a driveway on the right (not the 90 degree right but angle right just after it) with a small sign that says "Jessup." Go about 100 yards up that driveway to where our driveway turns right. Log house with red doors.










