How Things Change

Aviation security in 1950 wasn't much like it is today. It was just as well for me, at least in one instance.

On June 30th of that year, I left the Old Town Airport in a Cessna 120, N-72731, on a direct course to Montreal. I left from Old Town, rather than Brewer where the airplane was based, and from where my trip originated, so that I might file a VFR Flight Plan, in person, with the Flight Service Station in the tower at Old Town. I remember the occasion and the FAA Controller, except for his name.

Three hours and 15 minutes after departure I landed at Dorval Airport, but not without incident, and a couple hours

of concern. The concern related to the terrain I was looking down upon, nothing to do with the airplane or the progress of my flight, but with the absence of places to put a single engine airplane, on wheels, on the ground. I was familiar with the Maine backcountry, but I had not given it much thought until that flight time between Old Town and the relatively open farmland and frequent roads that appeared once well into Quebec. In Maine, only the road to Jackman seemed at all hospitable.

The incident related to a straight-in approach to Montreal. Just as I was relaxing from my concern about lack of landing spots enroute, a big airport appeared straight ahead with a runway alignment that looked like Dorval. My clearance from the Dorval tower was straight-in, so — I landed.

It became apparent, as soon as I pulled off in front of a large building, that I was wrong. A big sliding hangar-type door opened slightly and, before I could shut down the engine, a Canadian with a French accent informed me that I had better get over to Dorval. This was a military field, not accepting civilian traffic. He pointed. I turned back on the runway, continued a take-off as if this was just a planned "touch and go." Almost as soon as I was off the ground the real Dorval was evident in front of me. I proceeded on my tower clearance and

landed at Dorval. No mention was made, by me or the tower, of my "slight" deviation.

I was directed to the transient ramp, or tarmac, as they put it, and was met by two Canadian officials, an Immigration Agent and a Customs Agent. They peered in the right side as soon as I opened the door, asked me where I was coming from, where I was born, how long I expected to be in Canada, and wished me a pleasant stay in Canada. No inspection of the airplane. That was it. No passport. No identification proof that I can remember. I wonder how it would be today?

The next day I started back, but the return did not include the direct course to the Bangor area. I had seen enough of that wilderness. My route was Montreal to Burlington, Burlington to Portland, Portland to Brewer, for a total of three hours of flight time. I can remember no Immigration or Customs formalities, either Canadian or American.

Such was the careless freedom we took for granted in those days. Not only do I wonder how it would be now, but could we do it at all today? Certainly, not so easily and casually.

A New Book




Member Rodney Laughton as just published a new book: Scarborough in the Twentieth Century.
























The Maine Air Museum is proud to announce the new Memorial Pathway Program. Here's how it works:




★ Stratocumulus Member (Sc) — \$100 Donation
